HUNSDON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN SURVEY 2019 – INSIGHTS



Demographics

147 households completed the survey, representing 335 people.

ONS Census data from 2011 indicates that were 1080 residents at the time of the census, 856 of whom were over the age of 18.

The chart below shows the age profile of the respondents for each household (some respondents did not complete this question), compared to the age profile of the population in 2011.



The survey is over-represented by people over 65 and under-represented by people under 65, which is fairly typical. Nevertheless, a further attempt could be made to engage with the under-represented group, who represent most of the working-age residents in Hunsdon and may well have different perspectives to the older residents.



The support for Green and Open Spaces and wildlife was reflected in 40 of the Consultation Comments

There will be a need for some high-quality photographs (suitable for print) of the green spaces nominated for protection.

Seven Consultation comments wanted better GP services in the village.

Nearly 40 Consultation comments wanted better play/sports facilities in the village, especially for the young. This included better playground facilities, better use of the tennis courts, multi-use games area and paying field.

Fourteen Consultation comments desired improved cycle access and nearly 20 sought improved, cleaner, and more footpaths for walking.

Seven Consultation comments wished to encourage greater participation in village events, more generational community involvement and more active communications.

Heritage

With the exception of Briggens House & Parkland, and possibly Hunsdon Garage, most of the village landmarks are considered worthy of protection. No mention is made in the survey of The Village Pump, which should also be considered a local landmark. Ten Consultation Comments mention the historic nature of the village centre its surroundings and listed buildings

This list should contribute to the identification of village assets to be protected.

These too, should be illustrated with high-quality photographs suitable for print.


Infrastructure, Roads & Transport

Three of the top four bugbears about living in Hunsdon centre are the problems with traffic.



43 of the Consultation Comments were concerned with the speed of traffic through the village and on parish roads. Another 13 were worried about the A414/Church lane junction

And the overwhelming priority for an expenditure would be on road safety..



The focus of these road safety improvements would be outside Hunsdon JMI School, the "Rosella" bend and Church Lane junction



There is clear support for vehicle weight restrictions to alleviate the problem with HGVs moving through the village and the perceived safety issues with the volume and speed of HGVs. The largest number of single objections in the Consultation comments (48) were about the Heavy Goods traffic through the village and parish roads and advocated its abolition or reduction.





Car ownership is high - only four respondents had no vehicle at all (these are additional to the people who skipped this question.




14 vehicles are parked on the street, more than half of these belong to households with more than one vehicle, so one is parked on the premises








Housing & Development

Protection of the Green Belt is seen as Important or Very Important by 97.87% of people.






110 people said NO to further housing in the Hunsdon Area as did nearly 40 of the Consultation Comments Of the 20 people who answered "Yes"

overwhelming preference for any development.




many(over 40) of the Consultation Comments believe that if new homes are to be built they should be built for local people, with priority being given to the young and the elderly

Employment & Business

Only two businesses responded to the survey. It would improve the evidence base if a separate exercise was conducted to engage other businesses who have physical premises in Hunsdon.

There is support for more shops and a restaurant/café as premises-based businesses. A taxi service would also be welcomed. New businesses requiring premises should either use existing sites or use brownfield sites



for development.
